Breast cancer is the most common cancer in U.S women (not counting some skin cancers).¹

Early Mammograms can reduce the risk of dying of breast cancer by 20%.⁴

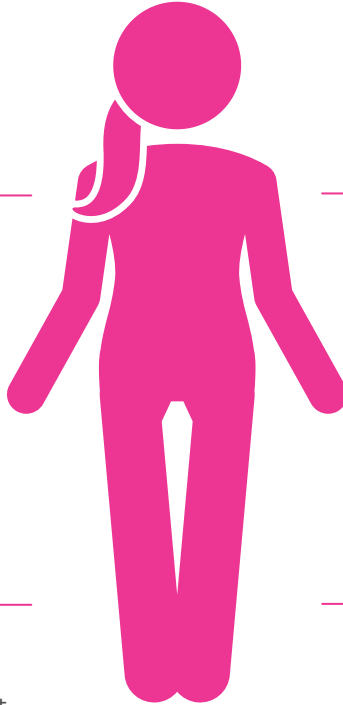
one in six breast cancers occur in women in their 40s.⁵

Risk factors

Age - Risk goes up the older you get.

Ethnicity - Breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in Hispanic women, and more common in African American women under the age of 45.

Genetics - 5 to 10% of breast cancer cases are hereditary, resulting directly from gene defects.

Family History - First-degree relationships (mother, sister, daughter) with breast cancer doubles your risk.

Weight - Overweight or obese women have a higher risk.

Dense breasts - Women with dense breast tissue are 1.4x more likely to develop cancer.
